Unitek USB 3.0 to IDE & SATA Converter, A Review

Every so often I am called upon to repair or remove hard drives and, as technology advances, certain proprietary connectors will eventually disappear from ever reading, let's say a hard drive. In this particular case, we had the last 17 inch MacBook Pro getting beach balls. A few years ago, we upgraded the drive from a mechanical hard drive to an SSD drive and there was a noticeable improvement.

But lately he was concerned about the beach balls (windows users have the sands of time flipping around) so I suggested that maybe an erase and reinstall would be in order. After a phone call we decided on a new SSD and clone the hard drive.

We did end up using Carbon Copy Cloner but encountered an error off the internal drive so we decided to remove the drive and run TechTool Pro as go to, but alas it upchucked on repairing the drive. Although Apple Disk Utility running First Aid saw no problems. I then used Alsofts DiskWarrior, a one trick pony, to rebuild the directory database, which it did and found several problems and corrected them.

So I went to my SATA Duplicator which copied bit by bit to the fresh drive a mirror image. While that was doing its job, I went back to the two windows laptops to remove the hard drives. One was a Dell Alienware 17 inch and the other a 1998 Winbook XL. I did tell him that one may have an IDE interface and I may not be able to read.

This is when I ordered the above device which arrived in one day! I proceeded to remove the two hard drives on the Alienware as I have upgraded this laptop previously and it was getting ready to be recycled.

For the Winbook XL, I had to do a search online for the layout and it was quite modular in taking apart the CD-ROM, 3.5 Floppy drive and the Hard Drive. Well, sure enough, that drive was an IDE and he wanted some data off it. Hence, ordering the Unitek device.

The Unitek device was reasonably priced at \$33 plus tax and shipping, if you're not a Prime member. It came with a scourge of a tiny CD-ROM. Only use it if you have a tray cd reader. NEVER put these in a slot loading cd reader. You WILL be taking it apart physically!!

Anyway, just by visually looking at the connecter side, if you are familiar with various devices, it's easy to see but, if not, look at the instruction sheet.

The IDE interface comes in to two varieties, one for a 3.5 inch hard drive, and one for the 2.5 inch laptop drive.

I have only used this to read the hard drive for a Mac User. The MacOS X will read NTFS formatted drives but cannot write to the drive. You will have to write on your own drives. You can still copy the files that you need to your local drive.

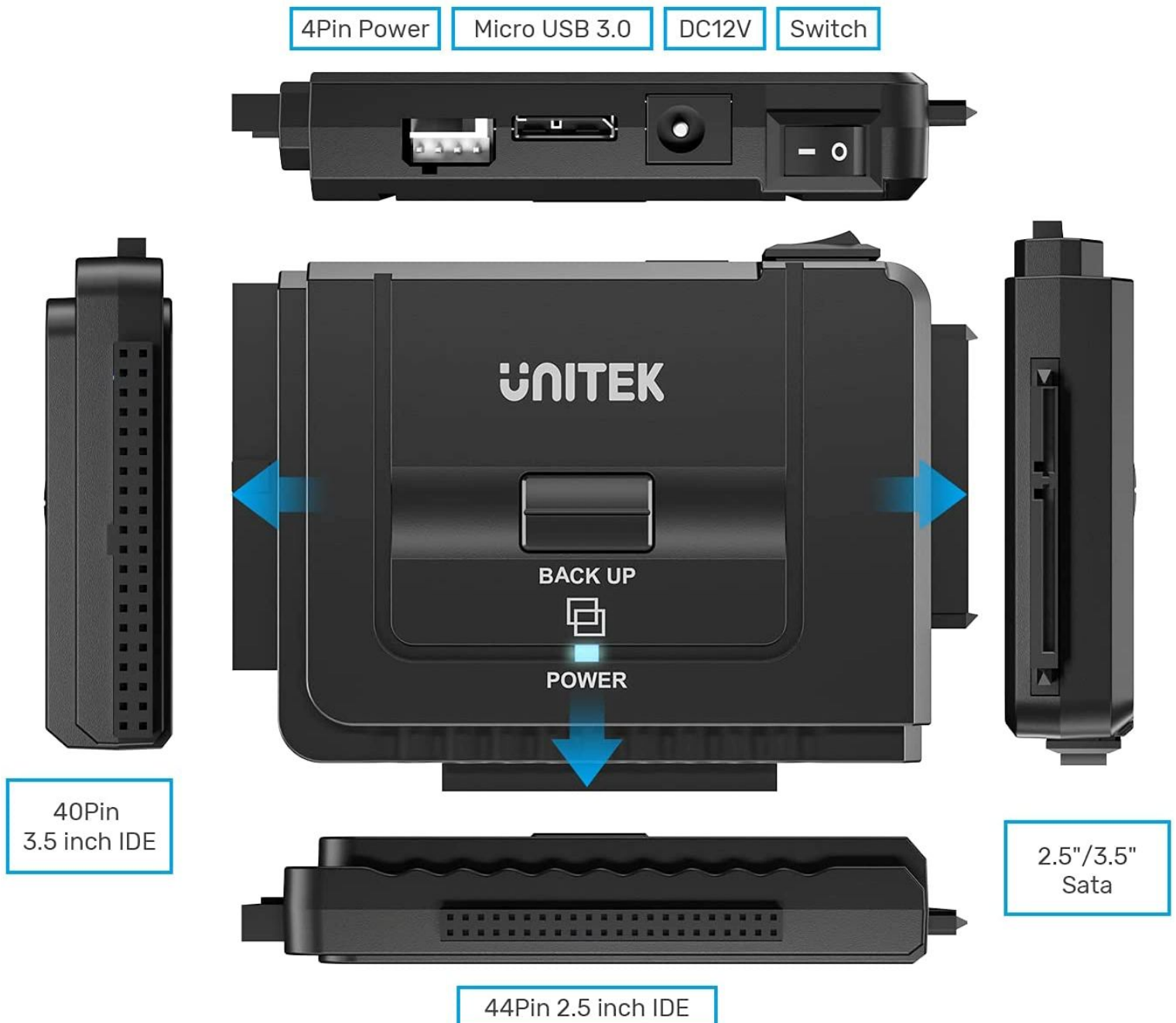
I did not need any drivers for the Mac and, also, on my HP Laptop Windows 10, I was able to seed the drive. So, this will work on a Mac and Windows system, especially if you store old drives after doing an upgrade on your system. It will read SATA and IDE drives.

The unit is about the size of a 2.5 inch hard drive but about 3/4 of an inch thick and has an on/off switch, and a port to give power to the 3.5 IDE hard drive (wire is included).

So, if you are looking for a hardware device to read older IDE drives, I recommend this device.

Smartphone & Tablet Report for 6/27/22 SIG Meeting

We began the meeting by addressing questions from several members including how to permanently turn off Live Photos since by default Live Photos turns on every time you open the Camera app and turning on the sound when playing back a Video you took since the default is sound off. We showed how to create a custom folder in Mail as one of our members wanted to learn how to use her iPhone to organize her mail.

The Calendar app is a great iOS tool for organizing events in your life and to remind you of upcoming events. Calendar can be used either as a client with other calendars such as Gmail calendar, or as a calendaring app. We demonstrated how to make entries, the value of entering location so that you can include travel time in your schedule, how to use notifications to prompt you of upcoming events and how predictive entries can make it easy to type in an event. A YouTube Video (Ellen's Tips for iOS) showed how to use Calendar on an iPad. We also viewed a new YouTube resource on the same subject (Rich Bowlin iPad Tips for Seniors) who include a few things that Ellen did not.

At the World Wide Developers Conference in early June Apple described what

features would likely be in iOS 16 and iPadOS 16 when they are released in September. As yet the first two beta versions have been released only to developers but the third beta will be released to the public in July. It appears that the iPad with the M1 chip will see the greatest changes and we viewed several videos that described what is coming to those tablets that will allow them to function more like computers.

Approximately 100 new features are included in iOS 16. We couldn't talk about all of them but we viewed two videos that focused on the major changes. The iPad will see most of these changes in addition to device specific features mentioned above.

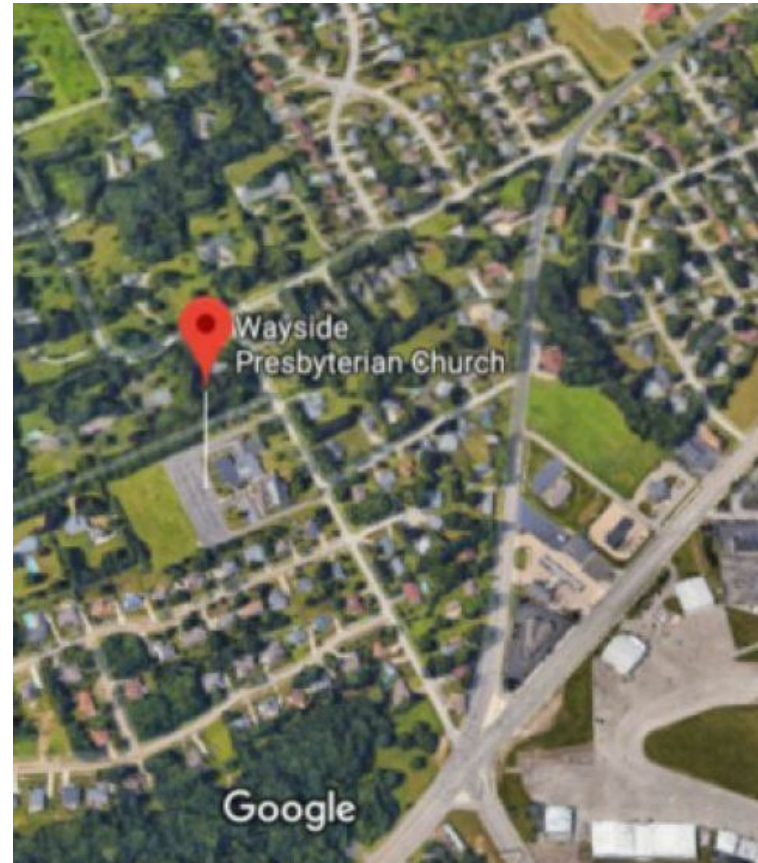
Directions to Wayside Presbyterian Church for CUE Meetings

Wayside Presbyterian Church, at 1208 Asbury Road, is approximately three blocks north of the intersection of Asbury Road and Route 5. This intersection is at the northwest corner of the Erie International Airport property. Following Asbury, turn left at the first marked driveway for the church. During the afternoon winter schedule (10:00 AM for the months of November, January, February and March), entry is through the two sets of blue double doors. Use the buzzer to gain entry if the doors are locked. During the normal evening schedule (7:00 PM the remaining months) use the double doors on the south side of the Christian Education wing. Signs are posted in the building to direct you to the meeting room.

From West of Erie International Airport: Follow Route 5 to the intersection of Asbury and Route 5. Turn hard left onto Asbury Road. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection.

From South of Erie: Take Interstate 79 north to the 26th Street (Route 20) Exit. Bear left onto 26th Street (Route 20) west. Follow Route 20 about 3.4 miles west to Asbury Road. Turn right (at the Sheetz Gas Station) onto Asbury and follow it straight across Route 5. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection.

From East of Erie International Airport: Follow 26th Street (Route 20) west to Asbury Road. Turn right onto Asbury and follow it straight across Route 5. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection. OR, follow 12th Street (Route 5) west past the airport to Asbury Road. Turn right onto Asbury Road. Look for the church on the left approximately 3 blocks north of the intersection.
